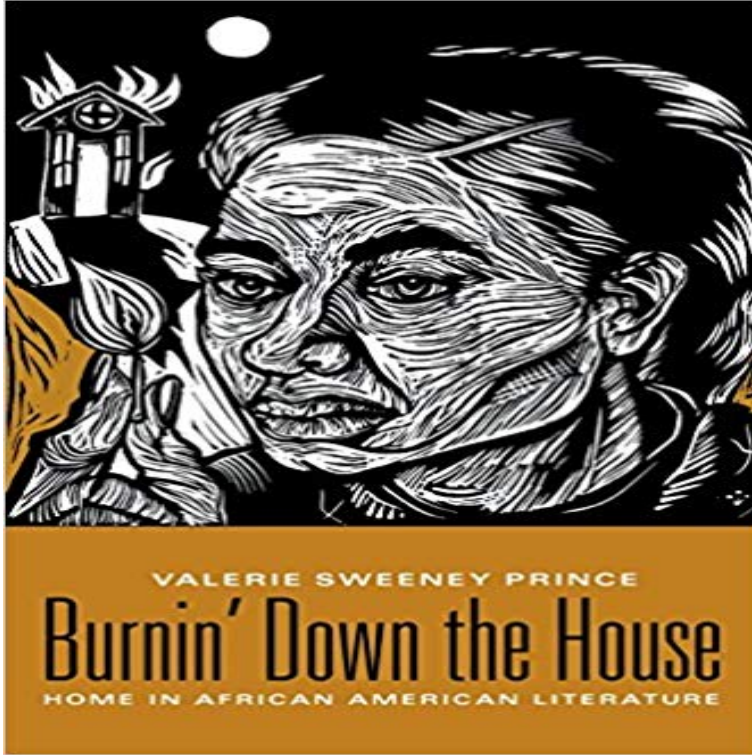


Burnin Down The House: Home In African American Literature
